

Christmas Tree Pick Up

Christmas tree pick up will be January 11th and 12th, respectively, depending on your scheduled pick up day. Please place your tree curbside the night before collection. Since the trees will be recycled, they must be free of lights, tinsel, ornaments, and bags. No artificial trees accepted.



Collection

Woody Waste and Yard Waste

Woody Waste and Yard Waste is collected every other Tuesday beginning April 6th through October 6th. Yard Waste must be placed in brown biodegradable Kraft bags which are available at the Township office. There is a charge of \$1.00 for 5 bags and \$2.00 for 10 bags. Please keep the Kraft bags protected from weather elements until the day they are placed curbside. The Kraft bags should be placed curbside the night before collection with your regular trash but will be collected by a separate recycling truck. Woody Waste should be bundled with biodegradable twine. Branches should be no longer than 4' in length and not more than 6" in diameter.

DO NOT PUT GRASS CLIPPINGS IN THE KRAFT BAGS

Grass clippings are not considered yard waste. Play it green by mulching them or grass clippings can be placed in regular trash bags for disposal (3 trash-bag limit still applies. Extra bags of trash will need a neon yellow tag). Disposing of fruit or vegetables from a garden is NOT considered yard waste (it is food). However, fruit from trees may be included in the Kraft bags. The remaining collections days are as follows:

August 10, 11, 24, 25

September 8*, 9*, 21, 22

October 5, 6 * due to holiday

The Township will be offering four (4) leaf collections in the fall:

- October 19, 20
- November 2, 3
- November 16, 17, 30
- December 1

Holiday Trash Schedule

Labor Day- Trash and recycling collection will be delayed by one day and collection will occur on **Wednesday**, **September 8th & Thursday**, **September 9th**.

Trash pick up will be collected as normal the weeks of Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's.

Reminder: All trash, recycling, bulk items, and yard waste must be curbside no later than **5:00 am** the day of pick up. Trash must be in 32-gallon trash bags or cans that weigh less than 30 lbs. Please be sure **all trash is bagged even if the bags are in trash cans** and actual trash cans are used (no barrels or other containers). All ashes, i.e. coal and wood, must be bagged. Extra bag tags cost \$5.00 per strip of four.

For oversized items (any item that can be disposed of curbside but doesn't fit into a trash bag), contact the Township office. Many of these items can be disposed of curbside with a

\$4.00 red tag. Bulk item tags must be purchased by 2:30 pm the day before your scheduled pick up.

Important: If your trash, recycling, or Kraft bags are missed, call the Township office as soon as you know you have been missed, at the latest before 10 a.m. the next business day. You can also leave a message on our voicemail after 4 p.m. the day of trash pick up. When you leave a message regarding a missed stop, be sure to include your name, address, and phone number where we can reach you and what was missed.



Shredding Event

As a reminder, West Donegal Township is partnering with East Donegal Township and Mount Joy Township to host a shredding event on Saturday, September 18th from 8 am to 12:00 noon at the West Donegal Township municipal building located at 1 Municipal Drive, Elizabethtown, PA. This event will be free of charge to all residents living in West Donegal Township, Mount Joy Township, and East Donegal Township. We will be limiting the amount of shredding to four boxes or bags of paper per property to be shredded. As it our wish to help others within our community, again this year we are asking those participating in this event for donations of canned goods and boxed items (monetary donations also accepted). Please be generous as these donations will be given to the local food banks. Their greatest needs include canned meats, juice, canned/boxed pasta, jams/jellies, cereals, pancake mixes and syrup, and paper products. Baby food and formula will also be accepted. Please no perishable items. Donations should be non-expired, nonbreakable, and all items should be in unopened containers. Glass, frozen food, fresh produce/meats or home-made food will not be accepted. Your help is truly appreciated by those in need in our community!

All items must be tagged and placed curbside the night before collection. Tags are available at the Township office. If you purchased a tag prior to September 2021, please contact the office at (717) 367-7178 to be placed on the pick up list. White Goods are considered Air Conditioners, Dehumidifiers, Washing & Drying Machines, Dishwashers, Furnaces and Electrical Heaters, Hot Water Heaters, Microwave Ovens, Refrigerators & Freezers, Stoves & Ovens, and Water Coolers.

Mandatory On-Lot Septic Pumping

While part of the Act 537 Plan approval by DEP, the pumping and inspection of an on-lot disposal system on a regular basis helps extend the life of the system.

Beginning July 1, 2021, Pumping District No. 2 has one year to comply with the requirements. Letters were mailed to property owners in June 2021. If you did not receive a letter along with the form and instructions, please contact the office at 717-367-7178.

Property owners in Pumping District No. 1, the area north of Turnpike Road, were due by June 30, 2021. Noncompliant letters have been mailed.

There are many signs of a failing septic system; backup of sewage in your drains or toilets, decreased flushing of your toilets, decreased drain flow from showers and sinks and unpleasant odors in your home. Issues with your tank could present as an over-flowing or near over-flowing of your septic tank and high solids accumulation in your septic tank. Water accumulation and wet patches in your drain field can also be a sign of a failing septic system. Be careful of what you dispose of in your toilet or down your drains. Never put plastics or any other nondegradable items into your septic tank including wipes. It is also imperative that the toilet paper you use be septic friendly; many brands will state septic safe on their packaging. By properly managing your on-lot septic system you are helping to extend the life of your system by alerting you of potential failures. It's important to take the time to educate everyone in your household about the importance of practicing good on-lot septic system management habits.

Medication Disposal Box



West Donegal Township now has a Safe Medication Disposal box in the lobby where residents may dispose of expired and unused prescription drugs and over the counter medications. This box is secure and will be emptied as needed by the police department who will make sure the drugs are disposed of in the proper way.

Any prescription medications and over the

counter medications will be accepted. Illegal drugs, needles, lotions or liquids, inhalers, aerosol cans, thermometers and hydrogen peroxide will not be accepted. Labels should be removed from all prescription bottles before bringing them in.

How to Recycle the Right Way

Knowing how to recycle right is important for reducing contamination in your curbside recycling bin. This article will highlight the importance of recycling right. A short time ago, Lancaster County began recycling only the Big 4, which includes the following recyclables:

- Corrugated cardboard
- Plastic bottles and jugs with a neck ONLY
- Metal food and beverage cans
- Glass bottles and jars

The important thing to remember is that these items need to be CLEAN. Empty all food from the containers and rinse them out. LSCWMA conducted a 5-day sample program of sorting through the recyclables that transfer through their facility in Lancaster. What they found were contaminations such as pizza slices left in pizza boxes, pickles and juice in a jar, wires, broken glass, diapers, cat litter, a plastic child's guitar, to only name of few. These items are NOT recyclable and along with wet corrugated boxes contaminate the bins. A study conducted by LCSWMA indicates a contamination rate of 28%. What can we do? Understand the importance of recycling right and how contamination affects the recycling process.

To recap on how you can help:

- Recycle ONLY the Big 4
- Clean out all items before placing them in the bin.
- Not ALL plastics are recyclable, only those with a neck.
- Hold off placing corrugated cardboard in the bin if there is precipitation in the forecast. Or bring the corrugated cardboard to our roll-off container on the right side of the Township's municipal building parking area. All corrugated cardboard should be flattened.
- Educate your neighbors if you see contamination in their bins.
- And "When in doubt, throw it out"!!

Our curbside education program on how to recycle right is evolving and will continue with new ideas and concepts so stay tuned for future articles. You can also go to LSCWMA's website for additional information and/or log onto Earth 911 to find other recycling options. If you still would like to recycle newspaper, check out the City of Lancaster's website for information on their Drop-Off Recycling Center. This facility is open to all Lancaster County residents.

Northwest Regional Police Department is asking the community to help make neighborhoods safer through participation in a camera registry program.

In 2016 NWRPD introduced a camera registry program for the communities that they serve in West Donegal and Mount Joy Township. The goal of the program is to promote safety through collaboration between community members and the Northwest Regional Police Department. Residents, property owners and local business owners are encouraged to join the program.

The program provides a quick reference tool for investigators to identify any video footage location, which in turn may assist with a criminal investigation that occurred in the area.

This registry will contain a list of locations, as well as contact information for investigators to obtain possible video evidence to assist in an investigation. The department will NOT have direct or remote access to any of the locations.

Accessory Dwelling Units or In-Law Quarters

Moving an elderly loved one in to live with you? According to the AARP, nearly 5 million elderly parents are living with an adult child in the U.S. Accessory Dwelling Units need permission from West Donegal Township's Zoning Hearing Board. The following are some things to keep in mind:

- One accessory dwelling unit may be permitted per principal single-family detached home.
- The owner shall maintain his or her primary residence in either the primary home or the accessory dwelling unit.
- Persons shall be related by blood, marriage, or adoption.
- One additional off-street parking space shall be provided.
- The accessory dwelling unit must be contained in or attached to the home.
- The maximum size of the accessory dwelling unit shall not exceed 60% of the principal dwelling OR 1,200 Sq Ft, whichever is less.
- The accessory dwelling unit shall conform to all other zoning and building code requirements.
- A memorandum of the ZHB decision and the conditions will be recorded against the property that all future purchasers may only use the accessory dwelling unit for family and cannot be rented, leased, or used as an apartment by individuals not related to the homeowner.

Short-term lodging

Short-term rentals have become increasingly popular over the past several years. In 2020, West Donegal Township adopted a Short-term lodging ordinance. Here are a few requirements:

- Short-term lodging may take place in a structure that would be a single-family detached dwelling if it were occupied as living quarters for a single housekeeping unit for a period of 30 or more consecutive days or units within a multiunit building which would meet the definition of "apartment house" if each unit were occupied as living quarters for a single housekeeping unit for a period of 30 or more consecutive days if the entire multiunit building is owned by the same entity.
- Parking shall be provided in accordance with the requirements of Article XVI for dwelling units.
- The length of stay per transient occupant shall not exceed 30 consecutive days.
- The number of transient occupants shall not exceed two adults per permitted bedroom.

- Events and activities such as, but not limited to, banquets, parties, weddings, meetings, fundraising, commercial activities, and any other gathering of persons other than the authorized transient occupants are prohibited.
- Short-term lodging shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local government laws, rules, ordinances and/ or regulations, taxes or fees, including, without limitation, other provisions of this chapter which would be applicable to the use of the property as a dwelling unit when not subject to short-term lodging.
- Registration required.

PENNSYLVANIA'S SCHOOL BUS STOPPING LAW

- When you meet or overtake a stopped school bus with red signal lights flashing and stop arm extended, you MIST STOP
- When you approach an intersection where a school bus is stopped with red signal lights flashing and stop arm extended, you MUST STOP.
- ◆ You **MUST STOP** at least ten (10) feet away from the school bus.
- You MUST WAIT until the red lights have stopped flashing and the stop arm has been withdrawn before moving.
- ◆ DO NOT MOVE until all the children have reached a place of safety.

KNOW YOUR RESPONSIBILITIES

- ♦ 1.5 million children are transported on Pennsylvania roads each day.
- ♦ These children are transported approximately 400 million miles to school each year.
- ♦ To further promote safety, school vehicles may be equipped with a yellow flashing or revolving light.
- ♦ Every year, children are needlessly injured or killed by drivers passing stopped school buses.

Winter Weather Info

The West Donegal Township Road Department is fully staffed, and our subcontractors are in place, ready for ice or snowstorms that may occur this winter. Please be aware of the following rules and guidelines that apply during winter weather events.

- * Please remove vehicles from streets and cul-de-sacs wherever possible, during a snow or ice event. Please also remove trailers, campers, boats, basketball hoops and other obstructions from Township roads/streets. This allows our plow drivers to quickly and safely plow from road edge to road edge.
- * It is unlawful to deposit snow or ice from your property onto Township roads/streets, whether the roads/streets have been plowed or not. This includes the snow left at the end of your driveway by the snowplow. Snow deposited in the street from driveways and sidewalks hinder snow plowing operations and creates a safety risk for other motorists. Removal of snow and ice from sidewalks shall occur within 24 hours, following the end of the storm. A path shall be cleared at least 30 inches in width. In the event that the snow and/or ice on a sidewalk becomes so hard that it cannot be removed without damage to the sidewalk, sand or other abrasive material shall be placed to make travel reasonably safe as soon as weather permits. Violations may be fined from \$50 to \$1,000 a day, plus the cost of prosecution.
- * Should the Township or the State close a road based on weather conditions, all motorists must comply with all signage. If you encounter a road closed sign in your travels, DO NOT remove the sign or go around it. Please find another route. Ignoring a road closure puts your safety and the safety of our crews and first responders at risk as well as opening you to a possible traffic citation.
- * If your mailbox is damaged by impact from Township equipment, please call the Township office for a review by management. Please note that the Township is not responsible for mailbox damage caused by snow being discharged from a plow.

What is your alarm telling you?

SMOKE ALARMS

- A continued set of three loud beeps—beep, beep, beep—means smoke or fire. Get out, call 9-1-1, and stay out.
- A single "chirp" every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed.
- All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.
- means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

CARBON MONOXIDE (CO) ALARMS

- A continuous set of four loud beeps—beep, beep, beep, beep—means carbon monoxide is present in your home. Go outside, call 9-1-1 and stay out.
- A single chirp every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be replaced.
- CO alarms also have "end of life" sounds that vary by manufacturer. This means it's time to get a new CO alarm.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

What if someone in my home is deaf or hard of hearing?

There are smoke alarms and alert devices that alert people who are deaf or hard of hearing. These devices include strobe lights that flash to alert

people when the smoke alarm sounds. Pillow or bed shakers designed to work with your smoke alarm also can be purchased and installed. For more information on this important topic, visit Fire Safety for the deaf or hard of hearing section at www.nfpa.org.

• Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced

CO alarms meet the needs of everyone in your home, including those with sensory or physical disabilities. Some tips:

Make sure your smoke and

- ✓ Install a bedside alert device that responds to the sound of the smoke and CO alarms. Use of a low frequency alarm can also wake a sleeping person with mild to severe hearing loss.
- Sleep with your mobility device, glasses, and phone close to your bed.
- Keep pathways like hallways lit with night lights and free from clutter to make sure everyone can get out safely.

TRIMMING TREES

Trees and bushes are wonderful additions to any property, but it is important that they don't become safety hazards to vehicles and pedestrians. To help keep sidewalks and roadways safe, please follow the specifics listed below when trimming trees and bushes on your property.

- There must be at least 14 feet of clear space between the lowest branches of the tree and the surface of the street.
- There must be at least **8 feet** of clear space between the lowest branches of the tree and the surface of the
- No tree or bush may encroach the sidewalk or street and block travel. All branches must be trimmed back beyond the edge of the sidewalk or street.

West Donegal Township Past to Present Part 17 - Shanks School

(An ongoing saga of West Donegal Township by Mary Conrad)

If you drop by McDonald's on any afternoon at 2:00, you will see friends gathered together for coffee. Clair Hilsher, Leroy Martin and David Heisey are a few of those friends who happened to be reminiscing about many things including their experiences attending Shanks one room school located on Bainbridge Road. Shanks School was built in 1883. Threefourth of an acre was purchased from Mary Shank, widow of Henry Shank for the price of \$88.00. At least 20 families pressured the West Donegal Township Board of Directors to build this school because their children had to walk so far to the next closest school.

In the 1940s and early 1950s, children were still walking to school. Clair Hilsher had 6 sisters. He remembers his dad putting the girls in his truck and driving them to school. Clair refused to be driven with "The Girls" so he ran across the fields trying to beat them to school.

Leroy Martin remembered that his dad, Jake, made a seesaw and some swings for the school. He said every game the children played cost the school zero dollars. The men remembered lots of fun at recess playing Collie Over, Prisoner's Base, baseball with boys and girls together, cowboys and Indians and in winter everyone looked forward to snowball battles.

Dave Heisey remembered their teacher Mrs. Ammon coming to school one hour late one day. She was not happy. Eventually she revealed that her car hit a bull on the road. She said, "I don't even know why farmers have bulls. They don't give milk." Dave whispered to his friend, "She's not a farm girl, is she?"

One frustrating day, Mrs. Ammon told Dave that he was the dumbest kid in school. Her total class size was 40 to 45 students, so he must have been really dumb. However, after leaving 8th grade she

kept a file on him. Every time she saw his name in the newspaper, she clipped it out and put it in her file. She clipped out the article when Dave became the President of the Builders Association. She clipped out the article when Dave became part of the State Builders Association. All the while he was quietly taking courses through the National Home Builders Association and all the time learning more. So, what would Mrs. Ammon say about Dave now if she knew he had built more than 2,000 houses, 3 banks and multiple parsonages? Today Dave Heisey smiles when he says,

"When Mrs. Ammon taught classes to all 8 grades at Shanks School, I was listening. We were all smarter than she thought." So many former students of one-room schools stepped forward to tell their stories. These remembrances will continue in the next newsletter.
